A wild orca pod can travel over 99 miles a day, foraging for food and socializing.

What you will need

- Paper Towel Roll
- Scissors
- ☐ Template and Pencil
- ☐ String (8-12 inches)
- ☐ Googly eyes (optional)
- Paint and brushes
- ☐ Tape
- Glue

Let's Get Creative!

- Use scissors to cut the paper towel roll in half. Cut down the length of one piece and flatten.
- Cut out template shapes with scissors and trace the tail, fish, flippers, and back fin on the flattened piece of roll. Carefully cut out with scissors
- Roll the mouth template strip around the other piece of roll.

 Tape together, then use scissors to cut out the black areas.


 Remove the template.
- Paint your pieces and allow to dry.
- Once dry, glue the top fin to the back of the orca using the tabs and glue the flippers to each side.

Glue the piece of ribbon to the tail of the fish, and the other end to the base of the orca tail. Drop the fish through the back of the orca and fit the silts on the orca tail onto the body part of the roll. Pull to help her catch a fish!
